VOLUNTEERING AT RESTART AFRICA

WHAT IT COSTS, AND WHERE YOUR MONEY GOES...

Unlike many Gap Year schemes and volunteering projects, Restart Africa is not a business so the fees go directly towards covering the costs of your stay (airport transfer, food, accommodation, laundry, etc) with a contribution to the welfare of the children. Our fee structure is as follows:

1 week	£300
2 weeks	£550
3 weeks	£750
4 weeks	£1000
5 weeks	£1250
6 weeks	£1500

It is possible to stay for more than 6 weeks where volunteers would like to add substantial value to our programme. Please get in touch with us if you are considering this. Contact our volunteer coordinator, Abdi, at volunteer@restartafrica.org for more details.

PAYMENT

Please ensure that you pay your fees to us at least 3 weeks before arrival. Most banks will charge a fee for making the payment and you should allow for this in your budget. The fees should be paid into the bank account shown below

WHAT'S INCLUDED IN THE FEES

- Transfers from JKIA (Jomo Kenyatta International Airport) in Nairobi, for your arrival and departure
- Volunteer accommodation at the Restart Centre
- You will have meals at the Restart Centre with the children. If you need any other supplies, you can buy them in Gilgil. Your apartment will have tea and coffee.
- A cleaner
- A weekly laundry service
- Wifi

AND WHAT'S NOT INCLUDED

- Visa fees
- Your airfare
- Your first night's stay in Nairobi, if you land after 2pm. We have agreed special rates with a local Nairobi hotel which regularly looks after our volunteers, so please ask us for more information.
- Insurance for the duration of your stay. It is essential you have adequate cover, including repatriation in case of serious illness or accident.
- Phone calls (local SIM cards are easily bought in Kenya and are relatively cheap – we can lend you a simple local mobile phone and/or local SIM card, programmed with essential numbers)
- Drinks and snacks
- Transport around the local area (taxis and motorbike taxis, known as boda-bodas) are readily available. We will advise you on the best and most reliable ones.
